

Durga Puja in my childhood days

I was born and brought up in South Kolkata but the four days of Durga Puja I used to spend with my family at my maternal grandparents home in Srirampur , Hooghly. This Durga puja was a so-called Baroyary Durga puja organized by a club but our grandma and all the aunts who participated in this puja felt like it was our own family Durga Puja. My sisters and I used to look forward to going to Mamar bari for Puja time. A lot of my friends used to ask why you leave Kolkata at puja time ? How can I explain to them that being with cousins once a year playing, laughing, eating, sleeping and fooling around together were the best part I used to look forward to.





Sitting with all the cousins on the floor and eating lunch on the banana leaves were the best time of the day. The fun thing was there was no daily routine to follow, no study time, non stop adda with cousins and numerous visits to the pandal daily. No routine would mean ample freedom . Astami puspanajali was a must for everyone the entire neighborhood would gather at the pandal for this auspicious time. I had never missed pushpanjali, arati and Sandi puja (if it wasn't at night). My mom raised us three sisters with an iron fist but these four days she wouldn't scold us for any wrong doings, she would be in a gala mood all day chatting and cracking jokes with her sisters and sister in laws.

Every evening we would put on new frocks (dress) and walk to the pandle and sit with all the cousins watching people all evening, visiting the pandals giggling at them for no good reason. The entire neighborhood used to be lit up with tuni lights. It felt like festive times looking at them being a kid. It lit up our minds with joy. Pretty soon Dasami will arrive and the elder ladies of the family and the neighborhood would get together for sindur khela and bid goodbye to Ma Durga. All the idols will be taken in a truck and immersed in the Ganga river. All of us would be in a somber mood, the entire neighborhood would look gloomy. Looking at the empty pandal stage where Ma durga was reigning for the last four days would bring everyone in melancholy. After dark we will go to our neighbors house to wish Subha Bijoya and get lots of misti in return My Didima would bring out a big platter containing different varieties of narus and gojas along with other mistis for all her grandchildren. We would have feast on it. Nimkis and ghugni were also served on this day for savory palates. Next day after lunch we would all say goodbye to each other and leave for our respectives homes. Since we used to live furthest we would take the train to get home. I used to sit by the windows of the local train on our way back. The autumn winds on my face and hair would lift up my mood for a little bit. With a heavy heart we would take the taxi from Howrah station and ride home leaving behind our cousins, our fun and our freedom till next year.

Petuk er Travel Díary – One day in Reykjavík cíty

Petuk is a Bangla word that means Foodie in English. I consider myself a petuk as I love to eat and enjoy trying local flavors when traveling to different places. My family can vouch that wherever I go, I am always thinking of food. Good food that is...Whenever we travel, I am always thinking about where to eat & which local food to try. My itinerary planning not only includes where to stay or which places are must-see...It also includes research into the best restaurants to eat at. I read reviews carefully before I make a reservation for a table.



For example, when we traveled to Lima, Peru, I called 3 months in advance to book a restaurant that was on the top 25 world's best restaurant's list, and I made sure that my travel guide knew I love food so much so that she booked us to experience two food-related tours when we were in Peru. I did something similar when we went to visit Washington DC or Sydney or all the other places, except Iceland.



Before I visited Iceland, I had the impression that their local food is bland. So, I did not really try to go out of my way to reserve restaurant tables in advance or look up local flavors. We landed in Reykjavík after traveling 8+hrs on Iceland air from Minneapolis. This was our first time ever flying the airline and we had no idea that this budget airline does not

offer free food on their transatlantic legs. A petuk had to settle on some microwaved things that were sold as cheese pizza mid-air. So, when we landed in Reykjavik, we were starving. Generally, all flights to Reykjavik reach early morning and hotel checkins are not till noon. So, we dropped our luggage at the hotel for safekeeping and asked the concierge for some suggestions for a good breakfast place nearby. She was excited to tell me about not only breakfast places but also places where I can try fresh ice creams and some fermented shark, a local favorite that every person visiting Reykjavik must try.

So, the first stop in the capital city was at Brauð & Co bakery. The bakery opened in the spring of 2016 in a colorful house in downtown Reykjavík and it is very popular as a breakfast place and is a must-eat place if you are ever in Reykjavik. And believe me, you will not regret it.



The bakery offers fresh & delicious sourdough bread, cinnamon rolls and assorted pastries made with local, high-fat butter Ágúst and other fresh ingredients. Their coffee choices are limited. Afterall it is a bakery and not a coffee shop.

After staring at all the warm deliciousness with fresh-baked-rolls smell in the atmosphere, we settled for cinnamon buns and assorted pastries and some fresh coffee. Their cinnamon buns were soft, warm & crispy. I could smell the freshness when I held one in my hand.

I couldn't resist a quick bite and found that the sweetness was just perfect – not too sweet that it will overpower you. There were few tables to sit but none were empty for a 3-person family. So, we took our breakfast in a paper bag and a cup drip coffee and slowly started walking towards the famous Hallgrímskirkja church, which is very close by.

Hallgrímskirkja church is probably the most photographed site in all of Reykjavik by Icelandic State Architect Guðjón Samúelson.. This rocketship-esque looking church's inspiration came from Iceland's looming mountains and sweeping glaciers. Most notably, the church's towering steeple and wings are styled after the unusual columnar basalt formations along Iceland's coast.

Hallgrímskirkja is pronounced HALL-creams-kirkyuh. That's a difficult pronunciation. But after a fresh cup of coffee in the crisp cool air, it was easy to pronounce HALL-creams-kirk-yuh. It means Hallgrimur's church. Hallgrímur Pétursson was a 17th-century minister and poet who penned the "The Passion Hymns", which became wildly popular and to this day is read at Icelandic homes (and even broadcast on the radio) during Lent.



Standing at 244 feet, Hallgrimskirkja is the tallest building in Reykjavik. It literally towers over the historic center of the city and offers one of the best panoramic views of the city from its observation deck at the top of its steeple.

After taking the customary pictures from all different angles, we headed towards Perlan which is around 1.2 miles walk from Hallgrímskirkja church.



Perlan is an award-winning museum in Reykjavik city that is a glass dome which sits at the top of six water tanks and is home to the most incredible and high-tech nature exhibition in Iceland.

It does an amazing job at pulling you in and making you feel immersed in Icelandic nature. The exhibits are fascinating, engaging, and interactive. We were intrigued by the deep look into the geological activity of Iceland and mesmerized by the beautiful videos – including the outstanding and moving Northern Lights Planetarium Show. About 10% of Iceland is covered in glaciers

and there are popular tours available to explore glacier ice caves. However, not everyone has the time or budget to take one of these epic tours. It is wonderful that Perlan has created the ice cave to give visitors an idea of how a glacier ice cave looks and feels like. The ice cave was off course icy and very cold, and surprisingly similar to the real thing. We wandered through tunnels, looked into crevices, and were very impressed with this realistic exhibit.

There was Ice Throne in the cave for a photo opportunity. But I did not try sitting on the throne. I was looking for the exit to feel warm again. We ended the Perlan tour by going to the top deck to take in and enjoy a 360-degree view of the surrounding scenery of this beautiful city.



After spending a couple of hours in Perlan, it was time for lunch. We walked back to the city and looked for Café Loki which is a cozy little café and restaurant very close to the Hallgrímskirkja church our hotel concierge had recommended. The inside environment of Cafe Loki is best described as modern and cozy. The cuisine is inspired by many traditional Icelandic recipes that were passed on from generation to generation. The restaurant offers a variety of combination platters which allows patrons to taste all the best authentic food Iceland has to offer.



We were hungry after the walk back and started our lunch with lcelandic meat soup. The traditional meat soup had local lamb meat and was wonderful. It was served with warm rye bread and butter. I have had rye bread here in US, but this rye bread was the best I ever had before.

It was finished within a few minutes. We were so fast in finishing the dish that there was no time for food pictures.

After the soup, each of us took a combination Icelandic plate that had 3 Rye bread slices with each slice with different toppings. First, one had mashed haddock, potato & onion called Plokkfiskur, the second slice with smoked trout, and the last one with smoked lamb. On the side, it had dried fish with butter. A small cup in the middle of the plate had the fermented shark, a delicacy of Iceland. This delicacy is to be eaten along with Brennivin schnapps (only if you are above the drinking age).

My not-so-picky teenager was suddenly very picky and did not enjoy the smoked trout or smoked lamb. But I am born a Bengali and never say no to anything fishy...... well almost. I enjoyed the Plokkfiskur and the smoked trout. Even chewed on the dried fish which was slightly salty and almost reminded me of the dried fish (Shutki) we make back home with a lot of spices & chilies. But fermented shark. I had to draw the line. This was chewy with a weird after-taste and I almost doubted if I am Bengali enough as I immediately knew that I will never try this again. But I have to say that Caffe Loki will remain one of my favorite places to eat when in Reykavik. It was a long day & it was time to check into the hotel to take some rest before going out to enjoy the rest of the city at the night. We came out and started walking back to the hotel excited and happy about the next few days of exploration that will take us all around Iceland's famous ring road but were tired as well after a long day of wandering around a new city.

At the end of my first day in Reykjavik city, I am happy to say that I was totally wrong about my thinking of Icelandic food being bland. The dishes we tried were not spicyhot but they are full of flavors. For a family like us, whose vacation & life, in general, revolves around food, we looked forward to bonding with each other, and reminisce about the best and worst food experiences in our past vacations without thinking about work or school or house chores. Petuk is making memories with her teenager who is almost ready to leave the nest in a few years.



SHIVA AS LORD OF DANCE – NATARAJA SAMAR

As a symbol, Shiva Nataraja is a brilliant invention. It combines in a single image Shiva's roles creator, preserver, and as destroyer of the universe and conveys the Indian conception of the never-ending cycle of time. Although it appeared in sculpture as early as the fifth century, its present, worldfamous form evolved under the rule of the Cholas. Shiva's dance is set within a flaming halo.



The god holds in his upper right hand the damaru (hand drum that made the first sounds of creation). His upper left hand holds agni (the fire that will destroy the universe). With his lower right hand, he makes abhayamudra (the gesture that allays fear). The dwarflike figure being trampled by his right foot represents apasmara purusha (illusion, which leads mankind astray). Shiva's front left hand, pointing to his raised left foot, signifies refuge for the troubled soul. The energy of his dance makes his hair fly to the sides. The symbols imply that, through belief in Shiva, his devotees can achieve salvation.

"quot;O my Lord, Thy hand holding the sacred drum has made and ordered the heavens and earth and other worlds and innumerable souls. Thy lifted hand protects both the conscious and unconscious order of thy creation. All these worlds are transformed by Thy hand bearing fire. Thy sacred foot, planted on the ground, gives an abode to the tired soul struggling in the toils of causality. It is Thy lifted foot that grants eternal bliss to those that approach Thee. These Five-Actions are indeed Thy Handiwork.."
